Notes from the CFO's Desk Delay in Distributing Contribution Receipts for 2020

Around January 20, 2021, some of the World Church computer data servers went off-line. During a network investigation conducted by the Community of Christ Information Systems Team and outside security consultants, a security incident involving malware was detected. The outside security consultants are familiar with scenarios like this and are working diligently with Community of Christ IT personnel to determine the scope of the situation. It is anticipated that it may take several weeks or more to complete the review and analysis. After the review has been completed, any necessary network rebuilding, restoring of remote access, etc., may cause the computer servers to be down for an additional period of time. So, there is a real possibility that it may be mid-February 2021 or later before we can print the contribution receipts for 2020.

Also, if you have an e-Tithing account, be mindful of ongoing phishing scams asking you to change your password. Always check the sender's email address to help spot phishing scams and report them to the Rocky Mountain Mission Center.

Since the computer data servers remain down, we are not able to print your 2020 Contribution Receipts. If you are in immediate need of a receipt, please contact Ruth Chatburn and she will see if there is an interim solution available to meet your need. We will try to the best of our ability to keep you updated on this situation.

Contributions during the Continued Closure of Our Facilities:

Contributions have remained fairly stable with a slight dropping off in contributions the last couple of months. We are doing our best to minimize as much expense as possible and remain within our budgets. We want to thank everyone for their continued financial support and let you know that we are very appreciative of the funds that are received each month. Please continue to send your offerings and contributions to Ruth and Gary Chatburn, congregation financial officers, so that your "Disciples' Generous Response" can be processed into the accounts that you designate.

Also remember that **cash offerings** like the **Second-Sunday Offering** are not being received as normally, so you might want to add that to the offerings you are sending to Ruth and Gary.

When day comes we ask ourselves, where can we find light in this never-ending shade? The loss we carry, a sea we must wade. We've braved the belly of the beast. We've learned that quiet isn't always peace. In the norms and notions of what "just is" isn't always justice.

And yet, the dawn is ours before we knew it. Somehow, we do it. Somehow, we've weathered and witnessed a nation that isn't broken, but simply unfinished. We, the successors of a country and a time where a skinny Black girl descended from slaves and raised by a single mother can dream of becoming president, only to find herself reciting for one.

We will rise from the golden hills of the West. We will rise from the windswept Northeast where our forefathers first realized revolution. We will rise from the lake-rimmed cities of the Midwestern states. We will rise from the sunbaked South. We will rebuild, reconcile, and recover in every known nook of our nation, in every corner called our country, our people diverse and beautiful, will emerge battered and beautiful.

When day comes, we step out of the shade aflame and unafraid. The new dawn blooms as we free it. For there is always light, if only we're brave enough to see it. If only we're brave enough to be it.
