Becoming a Sanctuary of Peace!

The days are beginning to feel like "fall has fell" and winter is around the corner! Something about it, however, lends excitement in the air, and I feel it for several reasons. I'm ready to experience something that in the Dutch language is called *gezellig*. Honestly, there is no exact word for it in English, but it is extremely common in Holland. Though the dictionary describes gezellig as "cozy," anyone from the Netherlands will tell you it is much more than that! They say it conveys a warmth that welcomes you in a way that is tangible. It is a "felt sense" that is present when someone enters a place or is with someone where wellbeing is valued. I believe this quality is found in our congregational life. I hope it grows as we discern a focused sense of call and purpose. "Being a Sanctuary of Christ's Peace" is language we've been given for this within Community of Christ (as our 2009 World Church theme).

Specifically, I felt it strongly when I walked into our sanctuary on October 18 and saw all the children, parents, grandparents, teachers, musicians, and friendly faces gathered to celebrate the **National Children's Sabbath**. The prevailing theme of "Becoming Servants" was evident in the planning, music, PowerPoint, readings, and most of all in the palpable joy in the room. It was felt in the sharing of the gifts of the planners and the children and their families. That was truly "gezellig"!

I also sense it now as we prepare to house the Winter Day Shelter again for the next five potentially cold months. I ask myself, "What does it mean to house something?" It's about providing a home. Today I realize that a lot has changed since last year when we made the decision to provide space for the day shelter. Some had felt misgivings about this decision, and it required courage. When I say courage, I don't mean the absence of fear, but "choosing to act with love in spite of the fear," a quote from *Hope for Today*, a daily devotional resource used in Twelve-Step programs.

This year, the decision to again extend that welcome was seen more as a blessing than as a risk. That may say something about *our* being changed!

We rejoice that there are more volunteers from within our congregation who have decided to "share themselves" in this way. Ken John, founder and director of the Homeless Gear nonprofit organization now housed in the Murphy Center for Hope, has expressed gratitude to us for responding generously in the Towel and Toiletries Drive coordinated by Rick and Kay Bunch and Pat and Bill Miner. These needs will continue, however, so we hope your mindfulness will continue, especially as you donate food items for the Larimer Food Bank on the first Sunday of each month. There are many ways to "pass the peace" in our community. May God bless us as we seek to provide a "gezellig" church home to each person who walks through our doors!
