I'm not saying that we shouldn't strive for our best or be sloppy but that when mistakes and imperfections do happen, we can approach them in a spirit of grace and love, with a relieved laugh, and thank God that we're not perfect and neither is anyone else. Thanks be to God!"

### A weekly Spiritual Formation Group

Beginning Wednesday, January 6<sup>th</sup>, at 9:30 a.m., a new small group ministry will begin. In recent years we've heard a lot about spiritual disciplines, and many of us acknowledge a growing hunger for a closer relationship with God. Most of us realize that in order for our spiritual hunger to be fed, it requires designated time for our "spiritual practices". You are invited to participate in what we are calling **The Upper for Our Inner Room**, by taking one hour a week to reflect together on our spiritual growth through daily use of *The* **Upper Room Disciplines:** A Book of Daily Devotions.

This group will offer time for silence, prayer, and scriptural reflection, but will do this in a casual setting where we can share together informally, about our spiritual lives. No one is an expert, and we'll share in facilitation. All that is required is an open mind, and a desire to be shaped more fully into the likeness of Jesus Christ. Bring an open mind, and don't stay away if you haven't yet ordered a book! We can still do that. Depending on the size of our group, we'll determine where best in the church we want to meet. We considered meeting during a weekday evening, but more folks were interested in a daytime group. We offer our apologies to those of you unable to join us at this time!
