Start Where You Are

"You already have everything you need." Two phrases that bring hope to me, release me, empower me, and, at the same time, challenge me. As we survey our circumstances as a Christian denomination with unique interpretations about God, Jesus, and a hope for the world, set in the western culture of the 21st century, I can't help but be impacted by such simple yet powerful phrases and ideas. What if we, in the Rocky Mountain Mission Center, took these two phrases and began to ponder them, pray about them, and live them? What if we believed that we truly can start where we are as sacred communities filled with the hope of the gospel of Jesus and what we need to move forward is already with us, in us, and among us? Sometimes, it seems that we can be overcome with how we might begin to respond to God's call to us. What if? What if we truly believed that we can "start where we are" and that "we have everything we need?" What difference would it make in our discipleship? What difference would it make in our communities? What difference would it make in our world?

Beck and Coopwood Attend 2010 GALA Retreat

Max and I gathered with others in the church's GLBT community for the 2010 GALA International Retreat at Samish Island, Washington, over the Labor Day weekend. Friends, families, and advocates from the United States and Canada met to share life stories, fellowship, and worship for another "mountain-top" experience on the bay.

The weekend's theme "Living in the Light" was beautifully orchestrated by frequent

references to local native lore and symbolized throughout our time together. Our guest ministers were Apostle James Slauter, president of the Council of Twelve and Kathy Slater, president of the Greater Northwest Mission Center.

Time was spent on ways to get the welcoming conversation started in congregations who have not yet joined WCN. Max and I were pleased to be able to share Fort Collins' journey; others, too, shared their struggles and successes in becoming welcoming congregations. Additional sessions included a discussion of the church's new Sexual Ethics Statement, which is soon to be published in the *Herald* and the procedures and preparations being done by World Church leaders for the upcoming 2012 USA Conference.

Not all of our time was spent in class or worship, but in crazy frolic with our GALA Olympics and the ever-popular Talent Show. Our guest ministers always seem to be amazed at how much fun we all have and how easy it is to lighten up and be joyful. One evening a special feast was prepared by our chefs that included fresh caught king salmon and blackberry cobbler, truly a traditional taste of the Pacific Northwest.

Our final worship service on our last day was unique to us and focused on the scripture from Doctrine and Covenants 164:9d–e. It was a sacred celebration of our call to illuminate the world. The service included a combination of two sacraments: the laying on of hands and Communion. For us, it was indeed a highlight and a spiritual uplift, and a most memorable culmination to send us forth.

Sanctuaries of Peace

First Presidency and Council of Twelve Statement

The First Presidency and the Council of Twelve Apostles want to be clear that while there may be disagreements over some issues related to sexual orientation, Community of Christ members and leaders should act firmly against any forms of violence, harassment, bullying, blaming, slurs, or jokes that dehumanize or degrade any human beings. The 1992 World Conference passed a resolution on *Human Diversity* (WCR 1226) that states: "...we accept responsibility to resist fear and hate in all forms and to strive continuously to eliminate expressions of prejudice and discrimination."

The growing fear, intolerance, and violence throughout the world alarm the Presidency and the Council of Twelve. Recently, young people of homosexual orientation have been harassed to the point of suicide. In some areas of the world homosexuals are beaten, jailed, or killed. Also, some churches recently have increased the volume and frequency of their condemnations of gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender (GLBT) people.

The church has not always provided clear assurance that our faith community and congregations should be safe places and sanctuaries of peace, where people need not fear embarrassment, harassment, or blame because of their sexual orientation. Our mission is to Proclaim Jesus Christ and Promote Communities of Joy, Hope, Love, and *Peace*. Therefore, it is vital that we engage in words and actions that "uphold the worth and giftedness of all people and that protect the most vulnerable" (Doctrine and Covenants 164:6a). We must work to ensure safe and peaceful congregations and communities for all of God's children, including our GLBT members and friends and their families.

We may not agree on all questions related to human sexuality and sexual orientation. However, we are earnestly seeking more insight and understanding. We invite all members and friends of Community of Christ to join us on this journey.





I am requesting volunteers for an event we host in Fort Collins for the Larimer County office of Veteran's Services called the Veteran Stand Down. This is a hosting situation. We are not responsible for running the event or providing volunteers, but I thought it would be a nice gesture to offer all of the folks who volunteer here the first opportunity to sign up. The Veteran's Stand Down is an event designed for Veterans who are homeless, in poverty, or are just returning from service and need to reconnect with the community. County Veteran's services bring together agencies and services to help in all sorts of ways. This event provides everything from haircuts and free gear, to VA counseling services, paperwork assistance, and legal assistance—all under one roof.

The event is November 10 from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. including a lunch service at 12:00 p.m. We need volunteers to help set up from 7:00-9:00 a.m. (5-10 people), to help guide attendees around the event from 9-11 a.m. (4-6 people), then people to help make and serve lunch and also be guides from 11:00 a.m.-1:00 p.m. (5-7 people). We will need to briefly train you for the job you'll be doing, but we will not hold any additional training. Please let me know if you are interested or have any questions. Again, we have many people we can ask to help out, but wanted to first provide this opportunity to all of you. Volunteers are accepted on a first-come, first-serve basis. We will give you priority to volunteer if you are a Veteran yourself.
