Easter 2006 found my wife and me in Brazil with our son, daughter-in-law, and grandchild. We went to see an impressive rendition of the Passion of Christ (*Paixão de Cristo*). It was held outside with seven magnificent sets, covering an area of 70,000 square meters. The set "city" was called *Nova Jerusalem*. The crowd of thousands and the actors would move from one set to the other until we arrived at the tomb to see the Christ arise from death. It was an event we will not forget, both for its excellence and for the authentic feel it provided as Christ drug the cross down the street right past where we stood. We literally became part of the story.

Easter 2007 found us in a completely different place. World Conference was over with its stresses, long hours, and multiple meetings and responsibilities. We had come through a long process of downsizing and redesign at IHQ that brought more than enough pain for too many. We had carried double responsibilities, had experienced the death of my parents a few months before, and our emotional and physical tanks were empty. Using our floating day off,

we opted for a four-day weekend over the Easter weekend from Good Friday through Monday. We wanted to get away. I was physically and emotionally bone tired. I was too tired to even think of driving someplace much less packing. My wife asked me what I wanted to do—and—I—didn't—know. One of my support persons remarked to me that perhaps therein lay the answer. Do nothing! And so we did. We slept in; we ate out; we did only what we felt like doing with no agendas.

In choosing to not attend an Easter service, I was deeply aware that what I needed most was my own resurrection rather than to celebrate Christ's resurrection. He lives to bless me with his love; He lives to plead for me above; He lives my hungry soul to feed; He lives to help in time of need. And so I claimed those words for my Sabbath weekend.

I was amazed at how much better I felt by Monday afternoon. My hungry soul was being fed! I felt like getting back to work and addressing the many issues that awaited. Physically I was rested and renewed. My spirit took some additional "resurrection" that involved a silent week at a spiritual retreat center the week after Thanksgiving.

What joy there is in the faithful belief of a resurrected Jesus that is there to help in time of need, who blesses me with his love, who pleads for me, who resurrects even me and will also resurrect you. May your Easter celebration this month be blessed by the presence of the Spirit.

Alleluia!
