The Congregation as Blessing

As I write this, I am well aware that we are right in the middle of the season of Lent. It is a time when many people have put emphasis on what might be sacrificed or given up in the days leading up to Easter. It seems the better focus might be on how this commitment prepares one, in a very real way, to experience the joy of Easter as the most graphic affirmation of love made real in the life and ministry of Jesus. The attitude of preparation echoes what Dick Foster wrote in his January *Communicator* article regarding the Evangelist Congregational Blessing.

The fact is, Jesus' life was a blessing to all of humankind, especially to those who caught the vision of what love could bring about. Our lesson for today suggests that we have the same charge, as a matter of life stewardship, to explore that profound insight and, in the process, become a blessing to everyone we meet.

Jesus' life was all about love. His emphasis centered on acting out that love in very real terms on a personal level—to feed, clothe, visit, and care. There are, however, so many instances where we are simply unable to adequately minister to human need on a personal level. Therefore, we organize into a church (congregation) so we might pool our resources, both human and physical, to

accomplish what we, as individuals, are incapable of. In that sense the congregation then fulfills the presence and fact of blessing. The congregation must be a blessing to everyone in its wake. Evangelists, as special ministers, are said to be "blessed to be a blessing." Congregations that live up to their responsibility in sharing the love of the Christ, like evangelists, are blessed to be a blessing. Just as individuals make preparation during Lent, the congregation likewise makes preparation to respond to the life and ministry of Jesus to bring blessing to people.

In our recent congregational retreat we began to explore the potential for that preparation by "following the Spirit" in the sense of adventure. Major themes in that experience were the discovery of who we are and where the Spirit is leading us as a result. On Sunday, President David Schaal challenged the congregation to consider the following as a matter of qualifying our people to be the blessing to which we aspire:

- Personal involvement of members that goes beyond our walls and into community
- Regard for the overall health of the congregation
- Ministry to young people and inviting them to likewise minister to adults
- Recognition of diversity among the generations
- Sustaining and growing into a welcoming congregation
- ***** Exploring creative use of our facilities
- Willingness to listen to and reflect on individual and corporate experience

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- Intentionally creating worship and celebration experiences that respond to the needs of the congregation
- Willingness and desire for personal and spiritual nurture which prepares and enables us to move beyond ourselves
- Pursuing the potential to which the Spirit is calling us

May we continue to explore the nature and purpose of our being as a congregation. May we make intentional preparation to seek the blessing of the Spirit. May we become the blessing to this community for which, and to which, the Spirit now calls us.

What DOES Matter Most?

Many of us in Community of Christ gathered around computers, television, or projector screens to listen to President Steve Veazey as he spoke in Independence on April 10. Thanks to the electronic age, we joined many small gatherings of our global church family around the world. In the context of a beautiful worship service, we not only heard an inspiring message by President Veazey, but we also heard music, special testimonies, and even announcements of new methods of selecting how we want our world church contributions to be spent! Our Ft. Collins Congregation is in the process of asking a similar question to Veazey's topic, "What Matters Most?" He pointed out that when Jesus returned from spiritual soul searching in the wilderness after his baptism,

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"Jesus strategically selected a scripture passage to proclaim his mission. By doing so he set the direction for the disciple community that would form around him." According to Luke 4:18–19, Jesus read from the scroll of Isaiah and described his call as being "annointed to bring good news to the poor, to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."

Christians through the ages have marveled at how Jesus was able to read that statement with such inner authority! Veazey said

Jesus was able to make this claim because he knew the ways of the Spirit. He was grounded in scripture, particularly the prophetic texts. He had spent ample time being shaped by the Spirit through prayer, as well as worshiping and learning with others. Being spiritually formed is foundational to obtaining a clear and compelling vision of mission. A compelling sense of mission springs from the overflow of deep communion with the Spirit. And such communion occurs when we engage in personal spiritual practices as well as spiritual growth through healthy congregational life.

As your out-going pastor, I am mindful we have been invited to listen to the Holy Spirit as we seek to align ourselves with how God continues to work in our greater community. Some of you may want to consider joining the small *Upper Room* group that meets each Wednesday at 9:30 a.m., to do just that. Do you wonder if we can develop the kind of trust that Jesus showed when he relied on the words of an ancient prophet...to help us see in new ways?

I invite you to pray for Dick Foster, Debbie Jones, and Marta Remmenga who have been appointed to share with your leadership team and congregation at large....some of the options that surfaced during a recent inquiry

process. I remain convinced that this congregation can and will make wise decisions about whether to hire another part-time pastor to work alongside the many gifted people now serving in lay ministry, or whether there are other models of leadership that will better serve our current needs.

Are we being called to develop Peacemaker Clubs whereby we can invite children into our building to learn peacemaking skills? Talk to Shirley Remmenga and others with a long-time interest in such ministry! Shall we consider offering the use of our Activity Center to meet the needs of homeless persons with no easy access to taking showers? Visit with Kay or Rick Bunch about this. What kind of leadership would empower us most fully to respond to diverse needs? Could our answers be "both/and" rather than "either/or"?

Let's not make this a time of uncertainty and indecision, but one of steadfast trust in the creative God who brought us into community to share the life-giving love of Jesus Christ. May our unique gifts, as individuals and as a congregation, equip us to share the "good news" with everyone, inside and outside our walls!
