"Words? Words!"

When have you said or written something to someone that made them cry, laugh, or gave comfort to them? When has someone said or written something to you that made you stop and think differently, helped you in some way, or encouraged you?

It is difficult for me to write, and it takes me a long time; however, sometimes it is necessary so I do it. I recall the numerous times I have been blessed by the writings of others. My daughters wrote messages on my Mother's Day cards this year that made me feel warm, loved, and brought tears to my eyes. I will keep those cards, along with many others from friends throughout the years, so I can re-read them and re-live wonderful memories of time spent with them. Written cards that I have kept also cheer me up and give me confidence on days when I need it. The same card has gone back and forth between my college roommate and me for at least eight years—it makes me laugh when I receive it and reminds me of our friendship through the years.

Words are important in two avenues in Community of Christ that come to mind immediately—the evangelist's blessing and the Doctrine and Covenants. We believe that God speaks to us today, and having these words written down are important to us and sometimes challenging. Sometimes God speaks to us individually with words or feelings of presence and comfort. Sometimes God speaks to us through others.

I can recall so many times when words spoken have warned me, taught me, comforted me, and even made me laugh. When our second daughter was born, a friend called me instead



of sending flowers so we could talk and share the moment together—so special! When we left Steamboat Springs after spending Mother's Day with

Amy's family, Arthur (who is four) said, "Mommy, when your parents leave today, do you feel sad? I feel sad when my grandparents leave." Some words tug at your heart and remind you to count your blessings.

I am sure all of you have experiences with words written and spoken that have crafted your life, delighted you, lifted you up, given you confidence, and so much more. One of the reasons I joined the American Association of University Women is because they have a "Hands and Words Are Not for Hurting" project I wanted to participate in for four-year-olds that teaches and encourages them to use their words in ways that do not hurt others. This program was introduced to the four-year-olds, and some of the schools have extended it to older grades in Red Feather, Wellington, and Stove Prairie. The children learn a pledge that

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emphasizes to them that they can make a difference in stopping physical and verbal abuse. There are many activities where they can work together and are encouraged to be kind to each other. Each person can make a difference in stopping abuse and violence. We all know how much words can hurt.

Let's use our words to encourage and empower others. Who needs the words you will speak or write today or tomorrow? Don't wait—just do it.

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Getting to Know You!

What do you know about the Outreach Pastor (Kay Bunch) and the Vision Ministries Pastor (Rick Bunch)?

Did you know that both Kay and Rick hold the priesthood office of evangelist and that Rick was first ordained a deacon at age 15 in Springfield, Missouri? Did you know that Kay's heritage in the church goes back to her grandmother, Anna Lund, who came from Sweden to live in the Traverse City, Michigan, area? Did you know that Rick can trace his heritage back to the Nauvoo era when two Bird brothers worked on the temple there and later migrated with Lyman Wight to Texas? Have you asked Rick about his Cherokee blood?

Why did they choose to live in Fort Collins?

When it came time to retire, they were considering either living at the beach or in the mountains. Having lived many of their married years in an academic atmosphere, they preferred to be in a college town. And Rick's many experiences backpacking and wilderness camping, as well as skiing, made Fort Collins a very likely place to settle. They say that Fort Collins is their "line in the sand."

What kinds of volunteer things do they do?

Rick, as a *master naturalist*, is involved in the city's Natural Areas. He also works as a naturalist in Lory State Park where he takes groups on hikes. He also enjoys expressing his musical talents in the Larimer Choral. Kay is the Hospitality Chair for AAUW and she volunteers for Catholic Charities. Both are members of the Interfaith Counsel—Rick is program chair and past vp.

What do they do for fun?

They have found Fort Collins to have a wealth of activities available—Kay does water aerobics

and belongs to a book club. Rick plays golf, and they both enjoy traveling and spoiling their grandchildren. They also take advantage of the magnificent Colorado scenery.

Where are their children?

They have two daughters: Kerby Bunch teaches pre-K students in Tulsa, Oklahoma. She also



teachs at Tulsa Tech Community College. (She adores the 4year-olds!) Amy Tirrone lives in Steamboat Springs where she owns "Tall Tulips Flower Shop." There are

two grandchildren in Steamboat Springs— Arthur who is four years old and Sofia Grace



who is eight months old. Thus, Rick and Kay have come to appreciate the trip through Poudre Canyon (Route 14). Kip (Amy's husband) has a landscaping business, so the

family is quite busy throughout the summer. A recent highlight from a trip to Steamboat Springs was the blessing of the two grandchildren. Did you know that Amy has been quite an adventurer: she was the fire chief in Lamoni, Iowa, a Colorado fire fighter, a raft guide, and a snow maker?

What do people want to know about their diverse life?

Rick and Kay have been many, many places and done many, many things. On their agenda for May 31 is a trip that will take them to Ireland, Denmark, Sweden, and Norway to celebrate Kay's 70th birthday and their 50th wedding anniversary. That will make 47 countries and six continents that Rick has visited! In Sweden they have plans to reunite with some of Kay's relatives living there.

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Some special memories from their travels are:

Riding camels in central Australia; establishing the first African youth camps in Zambia and in Kenya; going on safari on the Masai Mara in Kenya, East Africa; cruising the Mediterranean; spending a Graceland Winter Term in Bulgaria with John Menzies; (They were there the day before communism was voted out of the constitution!) attending a youth camp in Russia; visiting Machu Picchu in Peru; holding the red-eyed, tiny tree frog in Costa Rica; and the lasting impression that living two years in Tahiti made on the whole family.

As a "Graceland couple" Rick and Kay were married in 1962 [that's right 2012-1962 = 50 years] after attending Graceland. Rick graduated with the first four-year class in education, and Kay studied elementary education for two years. Rick began his teaching career in Belle Plaine, Iowa, where he taught biology and physical education besides coaching football, basketball, baseball, and track. Then they both went back to school at Indiana University where Kay received her bachelor's degree in education and Rick took his master's degree in recreation and his doctorate in parks management. Their next home was Oak Park, Illinois, where Kay began her teaching career by teaching first and second grade for three years. Their daughter, Kerby, was born in Oak Park. Rick was assistant director and director of parks and recreation for the city. Then they moved to Macomb, Illinois, where Kay went on to get a master's degree in education with an emphasis in reading from Western Illinois University. Amy was born in Macomb. Rick was serving on the faculty of Western Illinois University in the Recreation and Parks Administration Department, chairing the department for nine years. During this time

Rick was very active in resource management consortia in several state universities.

Despite some very attractive offers, they turned their attention to church appointment in 1979, undergoing a year of training before accepting the position as campus minister at Graceland College. [It's interesting that Graceland friends, Dave and Voni Simon, were going under appointment at about the same time.]

During the 1980s Rick had what he considered his very best job—Graceland Campus Minister. In order to have a closer involvement with the students, Rick worked as assistant coach for football and baseball and coached the swim team. He taught a parks and recreation course and sang in several musicals. He was instrumental in getting Chapel Choir reestablished. While they were in Lamoni, Kay created the Talented and Gifted Program for grades 2 thru 6. Ask them for some of their Graceland stories!

Then being church appointees, they went where they were assigned—Sioux City, Iowa which might be considered a "hardship" area. On to Tulsa, Oklahoma, where Rick was appointed stake president and Kay taught third grade for a year in a private school as well as teaching GED classes and basic reading skills to adults. Their final assignment was for 12 years in Washington, D.C., where Rick was mission center president. Kay says these were her very favorite jobs-second grade pull-out reading teacher in St. Patrick's Episcopal School and at The Lab School of Washington's Adult Night School. teaching learning-disabled adults basic reading skills. She also tutored adults and children privately.


