"Reflection—Renewal—Resurrection"

These three words continue to probe and linger in my wandering mind during this Lenten season. Years ago, while early in my ministry and occupied with vocation and family-raising activities, I gave little thought about my personal preparation for the Easter experience. It just seemed to fall into place on the calendar, whether I was spiritually ready for it or not. Now, in my retirement—and during the "lazy" days of winter—I work harder and more intentionally during Lent in getting ready to be moved by what Easter and the Resurrection, is all about.

In the early morning hours each day that I spend in reading, study, meditation, and prayer, I often move my thoughts to reflection. How am I doing in my spiritual journey with my Creator? What changes do I need to make throughout Lent to be more in tune with the Holy Spirit? What about my relationships with others? Who have I offended, ignored, found fault with, or hurt recently? What actions can I take to allow the Spirit to find a more consistent dwelling place in me? Reflecting on these thoughts and desires causes me to seek the necessary changes in my life that will prepare me for the culmination of Lent at the Easter experience.

I find renewal in these moments as I allow the Spirit to flow through me. I am reminded of God's presence and faithfulness in my life and know that God promises to do new things with me as I journey with others. I am renewed with a fullness of God's grace, knowing that hope springs forth for me and all others in the knowledge of Christ's redeeming power and presence. The words of the Psalmist are clear: "Create in me a pure heart, O God, and renew a steadfast spirit within me" (Psalm 51:10 NIV).

I eagerly await the Resurrection experience once again. For me, it's still a bit of a mystery. I wasn't there that morning when some of his followers came and found the tomb empty. But their testimony is enough for me to appreciate and attempt to more fully understand the meaning behind Christ, the Resurrected One, showing himself later in his full glory. This was new life for them—and it promises new life for me! That's what makes the amazing Resurrection experience full of meaning and hope for me, and for each of us!

And so through this season of Lent, perhaps you've taken time or had a notion to reflect, find renewal, and anxiously await the Resurrection day once again. Please join with me on Easter Sunday in the activities that have been planned (beginning at 9:00 a.m.), and invite a friend or neighbor to join with us!

Spiritual Growth Opportunities

As a team working on expanding our understanding of the Holy Spirit, we want to thank you for your consideration of and/or participation in the three sessions we have held so far. These were: "An Introduction to Our Present Understanding of the Holy Spirit," led by Brian Entwistle; "Centering Prayer," led by Sharon Troyer; and "An Introduction to Reike" led by Dick and Julie Foster.

As you know, the church is encouraged to "grow in spirituality." The three sessions offered were designed to help us expand our awareness of the Holy Spirit in our lives. We will continue to offer further exploration and discussion for personal and congregational spiritual growth. These offerings may be single events or continuing weekly sessions as, for example, the Upper Room study, which meets every Wednesday morning at the church and is open to everyone.

The next offering is "A Course in Miracles." During the Christmas season, we distributed a booklet regarding this course. The day has yet to be set, but in May we will offer a two-hour session to introduce the course. This will allow you to ask questions to our two experienced facilitators.

Getting to Know You!

Bill Norwood recently turned 87.

The occasion was properly celebrated at a "blue grass jam session." Bill takes his country western music very seriously. For instance, a song for which he is remembered is the following:

Chorus:

It may be silly, but ain't it fun; It beats picture shows and carnivals All rolled up into one. You hug awhile, You kiss awhile, And say I love you, Hon. It may be silly, but ain't it fun.

One day I took my sweetie on a visit to the zoo; A monkey and a lady friend were busy pitchin' woo. He bit her on the ear and then he grinned a silly

Grin. grin. grin. grin.

I knew what he was thinkin' when she smacked him on the chin.

[Reporter's Note: The Norwood family was a strong influence during my rebellious teenage years. They brought enthusiasm and music into the tiny Bozeman, Montana, church group with



various activities for the young people who were forced to attend by their conscientious parents. The Norwood Sunday dinner table always seemed to have

room for one more to enjoy delicious fried chicken raised on their chicken ranch. We drooled over Gordon Mesle's romantic courtship of his "Bettikins" (Bill's younger sister, Betty) at one of the summer reunions, and we celebrated at the gorgeous wedding of Helen Norwood and Don Macintosh at the elegant old Gallatin Gateway Inn. My younger siblings learned a very practical religion from Sister Norwood in her Sunday school class. Bill called my mother "Maw," and he tells of songfests around the piano at the ranch before my father died in a roundup accident.]

Bill has many stories to tell.

Particularly, he tells about his adventures on his motorcycle. He says that he was courting a young lady in Roswell, New Mexico, when she began to complain that it was getting a bit cold to be going out on the motorcycle. He said he'd go get his impressive Ford, which he had left in Montana. So he got on his motorcycle and headed north. He got to Denver and stayed overnight with his brother and his wife, but when he started riding again, he began to realize how beat he was. He only made it to Lander, Wyoming, before he had to stop for another rest. The next morning he was told that the thermometer had dipped below zero overnight, and it would be mighty cold traveling in the open going north! Sure enough, Bill had to make multiple stops that day to warm his face, knees, and hands. When he stopped at Laurel, Montana, to fill up, the

station attendant informed him that the roads were dry but the curves were sanded and should be taken slowly. Bill said thanks and cranked up the motorcycle. He averaged just about 85 mph all the way into Bozeman—he wanted to get home! His mom said she was most grateful when she heard that motorcycle coming down the lane. Sister Norwood always seemed to have freeway access to heaven with her prayers.

When Bill got out of the service, he had bought his '47 Ford that his sister, Betty, loved to drive; that is until Betty and Gordon took it on a trip to Washington State. On the way home, Betty fell asleep at the wheel and wiped out 14 guard posts just outside Three Forks, Montana. It wouldn't go over 60 mph without shimmying after that—not Bill's style.He traded it for a '51 Mercury, which he drove for over 100,000 miles.

Bill lives very happily at Parkwood Estates.

He says that after his wife, Aro Gail, died, he found that keeping up a big house was expensive, and he wasn't much at the cooking and the housekeeping. He had received a brochure from Parkwood Estates, so he decided to give it a trial run. He planned to stay only four or five days to see what it was like. He liked it so well that he has stayed on for nearly two years now. He likes the people there; he likes the good food; he likes the good service; and he likes to play the grand piano in the community center (as well as his own piano in his apartment). If you hum a few bars, Bill can probably pick up the chords to play along with you.

Bill moved to Denver in 1963 where he married Aro Gail King in 1964. Both of them had been married before. They were together just three days short of 45 years. She brought a lot of music into their home. They attended the Denver Central congregation where she was the organist.

Bill has seen a lot of the USA.

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Complements of Uncle Sam, Bill spent time in South Dakota for radio school, then he was in Arizona for gunnery school. In New Mexico he had bombing training and was first on B17s and B24s acting as bombardier and radio man. He then switched to the bigger B29s as radio man. He was also stationed in England in the Air Force.

Bill has had more than one family.

Bill had three sons—Kyle, who lives in California; Kevin, who was killed in a car accident; and Kent, who works for the city of Fort Collins. They were raised by their maternal grandparents in Butte, Montana. Bill has not had much involvement in their lives, although he has grandchildren and great grandchildren living in Washington State. Kyle did come to Bill's 80th birthday celebration.

Bill has, however, had quite a lot to do with his step children, Sharon Troyer and Larry King— Aro Gail's two children.

Bill is very devoted to his church.

The attendees of the Fort Collins congregation often see Bill at church. It has always been a very important part of his life. He enjoys sharing in the musical groups, especially. —Beverly Doig, reporter

Women's Group Needs Members


The afternoon Women's Group was formed five years ago and is presently down to four members. We welcome others to join us.
