"Love

February is the time of year our thoughts turn to LOVE... assisted by the ads, movies, and flower and candy sales. Love—it's just one word in the English language, but it has so many different meanings. In the days of the New Testament, there were four Greek words that were used to define "love."

There is *Eros* or *romantic love*. This kind of love is an emotion we fall in and out of. It is based on physical aspects and feelings, mostly our own feelings. It's about our desire to be accepted and loved; it is selfish in nature and expects to be rewarded.

There is *storge* or *familial love*. This is the natural bond between mother, infant, father, children, and kin. These bonds begin at birth, and sometimes need to be rewarded.

There is *philos love*—a love based on friendship between two people. It's a "give-and-take" relationship, where two people benefit each other in a mutual way.

And then there is *agape* or *unconditional love*. This is a love that is totally selfless, where a person gives out love to another person even if it doesn't benefit them back in any way. Agape is a love for love's sake. It expects no rewards; it wants nothing in return. Agape is God's kind of love. It is "seeking the welfare and betterment of another regardless of how we feel." Finally there is the highest type of agape love the one that is not human at all, but divine— God's unconditional love. It is perfect, total, complete, selfless, undying, eternal, and it is for all of us.

Paul provides a perfect description for agape love: "If I speak in human and angelic tongues but I do not have love, I am a resounding gong or a clashing cymbal. And if I have the gift of prophecy and comprehend all mysteries and all knowledge; if I have all faith so as to move mountains, but I do not have love, I am nothing. If I give away everything I own, and if I hand my body over so that I may boast but do not have love, I gain nothing.

"Love is patient, love is kind. It is not jealous, love is not pompous, it is not inflated, it is not rude, it does not seek its own interests, it is not quick tempered, it does not brood over injury, it does not rejoice over wrongdoing, but rejoices with the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, and endures all things. Love never fails." —I Corinthians 13:1–8

So faith, hope, love remain, these three; But the greatest of these is love."—1 Corinthians 13:13

Let's endeavor to ignore the media hype this year and focus instead on the greatest love, God's kind of love, agape, as we "seek the welfare and betterment of others" in our service to God.

## **Getting to Know You!**

#### Marilyn Garner is a very familiar face in the Fort Collins Congregation!

But did you know that she was born in Fort Collins and has lived here most of her life? Did you know that her parents' wedding was the first formal service in the Fort Collins church building (in spite of very newly stained floors and borrowed chairs from the mortuary across the street)? Did you know that she is part of the "Jones Clan"—there are at least 35 members living in the area. Did you know that she is the person who is responsible for the booking of our church facility to such groups as the Sweet Adeline's, a bridge group, the India Association, and a Brain Therapy group? She also sees that the necessary supplies are there for the kitchen, the restrooms, and the classrooms. If you haven't been to the Mother's Day Worship service, you have missed something unique. By tradition, Marilyn distributes plants to every woman, calling each woman, mother, and/or her children by name. She seldom misses a single name, and often weaves in how we are all family!

# Marilyn has always been an extremely busy lady!

She has taught Sunday school classes and sung in musical groups at church. She edited the *Communicator* for several years and served as pastor for a couple of years. She actively engages in the socials for the congregation; she especially enjoyed the recent "bunco night."

She is serving this year as vice president for "Friendship Force," and since the group does a rotation of offices she will most likely be the president next year. "Friendship Force" was formed during the Carter administration when he was requested to speak to foreign diplomats about a program of exchange. Their motto was "a world of friends is a world of peace." Groups of about 20 people from a foreign land come to stay in the homes of members locally. An exchange director from the club coordinates the choice of hosts and works with the exchange director from the country to match their interests. The same process is followed when families from here go to another country.

Marilyn has recently rejoined the American Sewing Guild which sponsors interesting programs. She enjoyed a presentation about computer generated patterns that could be transferred onto fabrics, including the generations of blocks to make up larger pictures as well as brocade designs to be embroidered. This group has a lot of local talent that enjoys "show and tell" of their work.

Cooking is a particular interest that Marilyn indulges with the "dinner exchange." Families get together once a month, each bringing six dishes to exchange for other dishes to take home.

Then there is the "Keeping Up with the Joneses" family event that meets the last Sunday of each



month. One of the various Jones families plays host to the gathering.

There is a theme food for each time—such things as Stone soup, a basil theme, pineapple express, etc. Gathering for New Year's Day is a Jones tradition. There were 29 of the extended family relatives at the last one.

Marilyn is very interested in story telling and she attended story telling conferences in Jonesboro, Tennesse, and Salt Lake City. In fact, she took her granddaughter, Emma, with her to the last one in Salt Lake City. It was a delightful experience.

# Marilyn is very much involved with her children and grandchildren!

Her daughter, Susanna, manages a local travel agency. Her son John is choral director at Loveland High School where he produces outstanding musicals each year. "Jekyll and Hyde" was this year's offering, and he did "Les Miserables" last year. His wife, Cinnamon, teaches seventh grade. They have two girls and a boy. In fact, Marilyn drives each school day morning to Loveland to help get the youngest two ready for school and onto the bus. Marilyn's son David and his wife, Lisa, live in Steamboat Springs. He is director of Support Services for Yampa Valley Medical Center. They have two boys and a girl. Marilyn spent quite a bit of time recently with the children when Lisa's mother was ill.

# Marilyn was and still is involved in Earnie's projects!

Some of you have fond memories of Marilyn's husband, Earnie. He was devoted to his church and was actively engaged in its support. He was hired to serve as youth director in 1968 and went on to work for Denver Stake in 1969. He also served as pastor of the Fort Collins Congregation.

They owned a furniture store in Fort Collins until 2007. Earnie used his influence to get some excellent deals for Camp Paradise and for Graceland. Earnie was overseer for the installation of the congregation's handicap lift and new up-to-date bathrooms, working with the local contractors and Don Worthington (the fund raiser) to save many dollars. He made it a priority in his life to be a part of the planning and implementing of his projects. After the excessive heavy snow in the spring of 2003 caved in the roof of the gym, working with Dave Simons, Earnie used his contacts to facilitate the decision making and rebuilding process.

In 2006 Earnie began putting together an investment program buying local properties

(which Marilyn continues to manage). In 2009 Ernie lost his eight-year battle with cancer, but not without taking advantage of the excellent treatment programs of M.D. Anderson in Houston.

#### Marilyn and Earnie loved to travel!

Earnie got a great deal on a culinary/bicycle tour of Italy so they traveled with Gary and Debbie Jones enjoying the country and its cooking. In fact, several of their trips involved sightseeing and cooking. They went to Yucatan with Debbie and Gary as well. Acapulco was too hot for much more than lying by the pool and getting in the water in the evening. However, London was action-backed with lots to see and do, especially the many plays such as *Saigon* and *Kats*. Marilyn and Earnie also traveled in 2006 with the Newmans and the Slocums to visit Ireland.

## PET(Personal Energy Transport)

With the start of 2013 comes another opportunity for our congregation to reach out to those in our communities, both near and far, who are struggling. Last quarter, everyone stepped up to the plate to ensure that Christmas would come to families in Fort Collins who might otherwise go without and to provide warm clothing to homeless people in our area. This time we will be looking to help those people who are unable to move about freely because they have either lost their legs or have lost use of them because of injury or illness.

Last Sunday Rick Bunch provided a glimpse of a three-wheeled vehicle called a Personal Energy Transport (PET) that provides those people unable to use their legs an opportunity to move about, thus freeing them from a life of immobility. The devices, built by volunteers in Columbia, Missouri, enable their owners to move about using their arms to pump the pedals. There is a small trunk for carrying items, and PETs are available in three different sizes. The cost for each device in \$250, and this includes shipment to the nearest port for delivery.

The goal for our congregation is to raise enough funds to purchase at least one PET to be donated to someone in need. However, I have seen the amazing giving spirit of our congregation, and I believe we can easily raise more than \$250. There are several activities planned to help us reach, and hopefully surpass, this goal. The March 3rd First Sunday Potluck will be a sacrificial dinner followed by a magic show performed by The Walking Tall youth group. The main dish, beans and rice, will be provided by Marilyn Garner. Attendees are asked to bring side dishes to share with everyone. All donations will go towards the goal. A series of donation dinners will be hosted in church member's homes for small groups. Donations from these events will also go towards our goal. Several people have already volunteered to host, and several more will be needed. If you are interested in hosting one of these dinners, please contact Kay Bunch or Max Coopwood.

We will also be holding a Change for Change drive between now and March 31st. Please set aside your loose change during this time to be donated towards our goal. A place, as yet undecided, will be identified in the church where change can be deposited. And finally, donations can be left in the offertory plate each week. Please identify these as going towards PET so they can be easily counted. The funds from each of these activities will be totaled at the end of March, and they will be forwarded on to the group in Columbia, Missouri.
