## Getting to Know You!

# So how much do you know about Tom Beck and Max Coopwood?

Did you know that they actually live in Loveland but choose to worship with the Fort Collins Congregation? Did you know that it was Jon Mendenhall (whom Tom had known in the Greenwood Congregation) that urged them to



join this very accepting and friendly congregation? Did you know that Tom knew Gary Clark, Dick Foster, and Bill Miner

at Graceland? Did you know that both have degrees in elementary education (Max a bachelors from UNC and Tom a masters)?

### Why did they decide to move to Loveland?

Well, Max's parents, Max and Helen, chose to move to Loveland from Denver. In 2002 after considering Fort Collins, Tom and Max found a house that was convenient for them to live together. Tom had retired in 1999 from teaching 32 years as a fourth through sixthgrade classroom teacher and as a music teacher. (He was nominated for the Colorado Teacher Award in 1998.) Max was attended UNC and studied for a B. A. degree in elementary education. Both had had full careers: Tom started out studying accounting to follow in his banker dad's footsteps, but he soon found that his interests were in music education. After two grueling years in Belt, Montana (near Great Falls), teaching music in K-6 and choir and band in junior and senior high (including halftime shows, parades, music festivals), he lucked out while studying one summer at the University of Denver and found a position in the Jefferson County schools teaching elementary instrumental music. After seven years there, Tom took a sabbatical to get a masters degree in elementary education.

Max's career path is quite different; he worked for Hewlett Packard before and after his time in the service. Attending night school, he was able to complete an associate degree in computer information systems, which he could apply in his work in distribution. But, the debilitating effects of fibromyalgia made it necessary for him to take an early disability retirement in 2001.

Both Tom and Max have interesting stories about not serving in the military. Tom was just recovering from extensive injuries from an automobile accident, which left him physically unfit. But Max's problem was being underweight (even after extensive stuffing on bananas and milkshakes). However, the recruiter in Max's case managed to make a "clerical error" enough to match his height to his weight. So, he served in Germany for three

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years driving trucks and in the Army Reserves for three years hauling heavy equipment.

# What are their roles in the Fort Collins Congregation?

Tom has provided many applications of his musical talents. We have all enjoyed his time at the piano and organ, his playing of his clarinet, and his organizing of choirs for special occasions.

Following his baptism in 2009, Max has taken his membership very seriously. He contributes often to the worship services and recently has taken on a number of projects the congregation sponsors. He also is serving as the congregation's historian and has co-taught the preparation for baptism class for two sessions.

### What volunteer projects have they chosen?

When Max's disability made it impossible for him to use his education in a full-time job, he chose to be a reading coach for the Loveland School District. He has also worked in outreach and fund-raising for the Northern Colorado AIDS Project. He served on their board of directors, but he finds that administration is not his forte. He prefers to be a worker bee! He also has helped to raise funds for the Larimer County Humane Society.

For three years Tom volunteered for the Project Angel Heart, which provides meals for the terminally ill (especially AIDS patients). He worked in the kitchen and delivered meals. He was also instrumental in getting the GALA (Gay and Lesbian Acceptance) organization started (a group representing church members and friends). He served as secretary for two years. Tom and Max actively support their yearly Labor Day retreat. Both Tom and Max did the Crop Walk this past fall, as well.

### What about their families?

Tom and Max make an effort to spend quality time with their families. Max is the oldest of three children: He has a younger brother and sister. His brother Steve, lives in Parker,

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Colorado, with his girlfriend Gail. His sister Denise, lives in Boulder, Colorado, with her husband Alan and their sons Ben and Jack.

Tom has an older sister, Dottie, who still lives in Tom's hometown of Billings, Montana, and she frequently looks in on his 92-year-old mother, Ruth. (She was my camp counselor at Camp Monyoka during my teen years.) His stepfather is Will Timms, a former apostle, who is 100-years-old. The church has been a major part of his life from birth.

### Where have they been traveling?

They both relish discovering other places. Max was stationed in Germany, and Tom spent two summers in Europe getting to Germany, Belgium, Netherlands, Switzerland, Austria, Italy, France, and Malta. They have also traveled to England, Ireland, Canada, Hawaii, and much of the USA. Max would also like to explore each of the national parks.

### What do they like to do?

Max has set as a goal to read a biography of each of the U.S. presidents. He reads a lot of history. He takes pride in his old Ford truck and likes going to see old trucks and cars. Living in Colorado, he takes advantage of its rocks and minerals as well as bike riding and photography. He can be found watching animated films and cartoons (He didn't take up my offer of my Bullwinkle DVDs, however). He is an "I Love Lucy" fan as well as an Elvis fan.

Tom sings most seasons in the Larimer Chorale, and he loves to play the piano. He also enjoys cooking and creating landscapes in oils and pastels.

Both enjoy gardening and making the most of their companionship.


