"Constantly Changing Lives"

"This will happen to all of you at some time in your life, and you will have to figure out how to move on." These are the opening lines of the play, "A Year of Magical Thinking" at Bas Bleu Theater, which Rick and I saw when we were docents. After a few more lines we discovered she was talking about death and life—moving on. Someone dies, and you continually look for ways to move on—to live.

Many people in Colorado have been hit with fire and flood disasters. Many people in our congregation have physically moved to a different house. Some have lost the life of a loved one. Other things have changed in the rest of your lives—children change schools and children go to college or another country to continue their education. Our children grow up, get married, and have babies. Something has changed in all of our lives. If we look at geology, oceans, nature— They are constantly changing and moving on. Change is one constant in life.

A few years ago when we were in Alaska, I ran across the book, *Two Old Women*. These women belonged to a tribe close to the Arctic Circle, and their tradition was to leave behind anyone who could no longer keep up with their tribe when it had to move to find food. As these two old women leaned against a tree and watched their families and entire tribe walk away, one of them said to the other, "Shall we see how long it takes for us to die or shall we see how long we can live?" They found many ways to "move on and live"—even to the point that they were much later able to help their own tribe survive.

We always have choices. There is another book, 100 Year Old Man Who Climbed Out the Window and Disappeared. The man in the story decided he wanted to go on living, and he changed the place and way he had been living.

Jesus' disciples had to figure out how to live when Jesus died. They were able to rely on his Spirit to enable them to "move on."

Our Fort Collins Congregation is always experiencing change and supporting others who are trying to make positive changes in their lives. We are hosting a Crossroads Safehouse Benefit Concert on Friday, November 22, 2013. Crossroads Safehouse is the only comprehensive domestic violence shelter that serves all of Larimer County. They provide safety, shelter, and resources for abused women and children in a state-of-the-art facility helping them to build lives without violence. Chad Elliott, a Graceland University graduate, folk singer guitarist, Iowa artisan, and songwriter will be performing. We will provide an evening of fellowship, food, fun, and spirited giving in honor of Crossroads Safehouse that evening. This facility is consistently overtaxed with a growing demand to provide services and safety to an increasing number of women.

We, the Fort Collins Community of Christ, have accepted the challenge to grow, move on, live, and help others enrich their lives. May we always look for ways to enrich our own lives, search, and be alert to ways we can help others. This is my challenge to all of us.
