"Sabbath implies a willingness to be surprised by unexpected grace, to partake of those potent moments when creation renews itself, when what is finished inevitably recedes, and the sacred forces of healing astonish us with the unending promise of love and life."

I was meditating in the Temple Chapel in Independence, Missouri, a few years back, cogitating at times and just sitting in stillness at times, wondering about how we westernminded people can get hold of the power of healing stillness. Why do we (I) often feel that we must be doing something for healing to occur, rather than just sitting still in God's presence. Don't we have to do something for our spirits to be transformed, to be healed?

It was then that grace surprised me, and I saw what was always there. If I cut my finger, I clean it, put some antiseptic cream on it, cover it with a bandage, and do nothing else. If I break a bone, I get it set—if needed—and a cast is applied to hold the break still. And in this stillness the healing occurs without me doing anything else. As it is with the body, so it is with our spirits that are often broken, bruised, cut, or damaged. If we respect the fertile healing stillness of Sabbath, we find ourselves being healed by the mystery of God's divine activity, which we are unaware of most of the time. Here in stillness, sacred forces are

released that astonish us over and over again. The body and the spirit need similar things nourishment, exercise, and rest. In addition, it is the healing stillness of rest that we too often deny both the body and the spirit, but especially the spirit!

Still I exclaim in my humanity, "Isn't there something for me to do?" Yes, there is. In the words of Ruth Haley Barton, I can "create the conditions in which spiritual transformation can take place, by developing and maintaining a rhythm of spiritual practices that keep me open and available to God." That happens most often when I am silent, present, and aware of God's counsel to be still!

Lent is now over for the 2014 Easter season, and I found my attempts to utilize the Lenten season for some stillness time this year to be an utter failure. I let too many other things distract me. Nevertheless, the beauty of our relationship with God is that it can take place at any time. We are not limited to the Lenten season. We can resurrect the "conditions in which spiritual transformation can take place" at any time during the year.

Therefore, as I continue my quest to carve out space for stillness, I encourage you to also be aware of the depth of your relationship to God and not wait until the next Lenten season to present your spirits for transformation.

Youth Fund

At the March 5, 2014, Leadership Council meeting, the council approved the following resolution which will be brought to the congregation at our next business meeting.

Resolution for Youth Support

Whereas, our youth are highly valued and are an important part of our congregational life; and

Whereas, the youth are encouraged to attend the Community of Christ sponsored youth activities such as congregational special activities, Rocky Mountain Mission Center activities: spring and fall retreats, summer camps; and World Church scheduled activities: International Youth Forum (IYF), SPECTACULAR, and Peace Colloquy, and

Whereas, the transportation costs are often more than normal family budgets can handle thus preventing participations in these activities for many of our youth; and

Whereas, these activities are extremely important in the spiritual and social development of our youth; therefore be it

Resolved, that the Fort Collins Congregation continue to subsidize 90 percent of the registration fees for all Community of Christ sponsored youth activities plus 50 percent of the transportation costs for any and all of these church sponsored activities, and be it further

Resolved, that a *Youth Activity Fund* be established with sufficient funds designated in the congregational budget to cover these costs, and where donations for youth activities can be made to support our youth.



Support for Faith Family Hospitality

The Leadership Council had previously announced that Second-Sunday Offerings would go to support the Faith Family Hospitality program. We have since learned that one of the sponsoring churchs had paid for FFH families to spend two nights in a motel at Christmas along with a food voucher and gifts for the children. Since Christmas will fall during the week we will help the FFH families at the Mennonite church, the council voted to use the funds we raise throught the Second-Sunday Offerings to support a similar activity at Christmas for the families.
