## "Fresh Veggies!"

It started a couple of years ago with a desire for fresh, homegrown vegetables. We made some raised beds and filled them with nutritious soil and compost. We knew there would be hungry deer close by so we put up a six-foot fence to keep them out. We thought we had a good, safe garden area and planted our crops: including beans, tomatoes, squash, beets, and kale. Soon there were small plants poking their heads up through the soil. They were only an inch tall when they just disappeared one morning. Had the deer somehow gotten into the garden? No. It was most likely a rabbit or small rodent.

The following year we planted and covered the seeds with netting. The plants grew in safety. As they got bigger we removed the netting so the bees could pollinate the blossoms hoping the plants were large enough that some mild pruning by the critters could be tolerated. All



seemed fine until the beans started climbing. Their single long stem was vulnerable—one bite and the entire vine shriveled and died. Then a spring hailstorm wiped out the

tomatoes and zucchinis.

This year we covered the seedlings and lined the six-foot fence with netting in an effort to deter the small rodents. So far, so good. We also strung a tarp over the garden during the threat of hailstorms. So far, so good. The result: we have been able to harvest beans, squash, tomatoes, kale, and beets.

How often are our lives like gardening? We start out with a desire to be a good person, to be loving and caring, to follow Christ's teachings. We prepare. We study the scriptures and pray. We come to church and surround ourselves with church school and friends. We do everything we can on our end to have a good "garden" and produce good fruits. However, there is always something to munch us down in our growth: a misunderstanding, a harsh word, a misinterpreted action, an emotional storm. We put up our fences, netting, and tarps to try to protect ourselves better for the next time. We prepare again. With each day and each setback we grow stronger until we are big enough to survive and are able to share some of ourselves with others around us, to reach out to those in need in our community, to share our building with various groups, and to support our friends when they are suffering.

However, this is not our own garden. It belongs to God. He is the true gardener here. He helps us prepare our hearts. He protects us and keeps the "munchers" at bay until we are strong enough. It is through his loving hand that we are able to grow tall and strong so we may in turn help others.

In his garden we are a "community"—with fruit aplenty to share.

"We all have the seeds of love in us. We can develop this wonderful source of energy, nurturing the unconditional love that does not expect anything in return... We begin practicing the love meditation on ourselves ("1"). Until we are able to love and take care of ourselves, we cannot be of much help to others. After that we can practice on others ("he/she", "they") —first on someone we like, then on someone neutral to us, then someone we love, and finally someone the mere thought of whom makes us suffer." —**The Heart of the Buddha's Teaching** by Thich Nhat Hanh.
