"Overcoming Contact Bias" By Richard Rohr

Brian McLaren and Jacqui Lewis, my conversation partners in the recent podcast series," Learning How to See", understand that Jesus' model of acceptance, inclusion, and love for "the other," helps us overcome and heal our biases. Brian describes what he calls "contact bias," when a lack of personal and ongoing contact with people who are different from us causes us to fail to see them for who they truly are:

When I don't have intense and sustained personal contact with "the other," my prejudices and false assumptions go unchallenged. Think of the child who is told by people he trusts that people of another race, religion, culture, sexual orientation, or class are dirty and dangerous.

You can immediately see the self-reinforcing cycle: those people are dirty or dangerous, so I will distrust and avoid them, which means I will never have sustained and respectful interactive contact with them, which means I will never discover that they are actually wonderful people to be around....

In this way, the prejudice cycle spins on, unchallenged across generations. As prejudice persists, it becomes embedded in cultures and institutions, creating systems of racism and April 2021 Communicator hatred, marginalizing groups who are stigmatized, dehumanized, scapegoated, exploited, oppressed, or even killed....

But if we are willing to listen to ["the other"] and learn from them, we can break out of our contact bias, which opens us up to seeing in a new way....



On page after page of the Gospels, Jesus doesn't dominate the other, avoid the other, colonize the other, intimidate the other, demonize the other, or marginalize the other. Instead, he incarnates into the other, joins the other in solidarity, protects the other, listens to the other, serves the other, and even lays down his life for the other. [1] Rev. Dr. Jacqui Lewis, who leads what she describes as a "multi-everything" congregation in New York City, shares the gifts that embracing the other can bring. She views inclusion as central to the Gospel call to love:

The one we follow into mission and ministry-Jesus the Christ—was an avowed boundary crosser, a reformer of the religious and secular culture of his time. We are in good company when we lead the way on radical inclusion of those different from ourselves. In some contexts that might mean a black church reaching out to Korean neighbors, a Latino congregation starting a ministry to immigrant families from North Africa, or a Chinese church hosting an afterschool program for African American junior high students.... We believe the commitment to inclusion and diversity is a high calling, issued to all who count themselves as Christians, no matter what our ethnicity or culture. [2]

The more we bump into the folks who are socalled "other," the more we are stretched, the more we are pulled out of that bias and have new truths because we have tangible evidence of the beautiful, powerful creativity of our God who made all of this diversity for us to enjoy. [3]

Joyous Worldwide Easter Service Planned



An online Easter worship event 4 April is shaping up to be a globally diverse celebration.

"Breathe New Life" airs at 4:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. Central Daylight Time. Participants will be encouraged to post their thoughts in social media as the recorded service plays on YouTube and Facebook. Multiple languages will be available in captions.

Worship begins with a Tahitian guitar performance reflecting on Psalm 30:11:

You have turned my mourning into dancing; you have taken off my sackcloth and clothed me with joy.

Several young adults, including Humberto Tinsman of the United States and Gonzalo Mejia, Jr. of Honduras, will remind us to look for Christ's peace, breathing new life. As a global community, we, in turn, will respond in singing, dancing, and sharing where we see Christ's peace breathing new life. Church members and friends have been asked to submit videos of themselves dancing to "Takwaba Uwabanga Yesu!"/"There's No One Like Jesus" from *Community of Christ Sings*.

The community will be invited to sing "Mfurahini Haleluya," 471 in *CCS*, with members from Congo and "Crown Him with Many Crowns," *CCS* 39, with Jan Kraybill leading. Kraybill, a Grammy nominee, is organist-in-residence at International Headquarters, Independence, Missouri, USA. A prayer of invitation, offered by Annette Henstra of The Netherlands, will be in Dutch.

Communion (the Lord's Supper) opens with "Hallelujah! We Sing Your Praises," *CCS* 656, performed by participants from Europe.

Apostle Catherine Mambwe of Zambia, focusing on John 20:21, will offer the homily. As member-submitted photos of the emblems are shown, Raraii Tama of French Polynesia will play guitar. Apostle Carlos Enrique Mejia of Honduras will invite participants to Communion.

Apostle Mareva Arnaud Tchong of Tahiti follows with a combined prayer. Organist Jan Kraybill will play while all are invited to take the Communion emblems.

Kathy Fallon of the United States will play a guitar arrangement of "For Everyone Born," as participants share in a global passing of the peace, beginning with Apostle Bunda Chibwe offering the Prayer for Peace in Icibemba from the Temple Sanctuary. Bibek Nayak of Nepal will share in the Disciples' Generous Response.

The community will sing "For Everyone Born," *CCS* 285, followed by a Sending Forth Statement.

Kraybill concludes the service with an upbeat postlude, an abbreviated "Toccata from Organ Symphony No. 5" by Charles-Marie Widor.



World Conference Delayed
